RECOGNIZING AND CORRECTING RUN-ON SENTENCES

Combining sentences increases our sentence variety. However, when two independent clauses are written together without punctuation or connecting words, the result is an error called a *fused sentence*. When two independent clauses are written together with only a comma connecting them, the result is a similar type of error called a *comma splice*.

Fused Sentences: Jennifer is taking classes in culinary arts she plans to become a chef.

Comma splice: Jennifer is taking classes in culinary arts, she plans to become a chef.

CORRECTING FUSED SENTENCES or COMMA SPLICES

Let's look at four different ways to correct a run-on sentence or a comma splice.

1. Make the two independent clauses into two sentences by separating the two independent clauses with a *period* and a *capital letter*.

Example: Jennifer is taking classes in culinary arts. She plans to become a chef.

2. Combine the two independent clauses with *a comma and a coordinating conjunction*.

Coordinating conjunctions = *but, or, yet, so, for, and, nor*

Example: Jennifer is taking classes in culinary arts, for she plans to become a chef.

3. Change one of the sentences into a dependent clause and combine them.

Example: Jennifer is taking classes in culinary arts since she plans to become a chef.

or

Because she plans to become a chef, Jennifer is taking classes in culinary arts.

or

Jennifer, who plans to become a chef, is taking classes in culinary arts.

4. Link the independent clauses with a semicolon. Use this method only occasionally and when the ideas are closely linked.

Example: Jennifer is taking classes in culinary arts; she plans to become a chef.
